As announced during the December meeting, we are going to have a workshop during Club night, commencing at the January meeting and finalizing at the February meeting.

Workshop in the works... Multiple trunk Smoothleafed Elm (Ulmus carpinifolia)

There are a few of these trees growing In George's field propagated from cuttings taken in Ohio in the early 1990's. Some are single trunk, but most have multiple trunks. These trees will be ideal for an outdoor workshop, where the registrants will start by digging their trees from the ground (yes we can give you a hand digging) and then working on them. We do not have a date yet, as we will wait for some warmer weather, but if you are interested, please let us know.

The following article was taken from the Bonsai Journal of The American Bonsai Society / Winter 1990, by Kelley Adkins, Lake Bluff, Illinois:

The material used in my Friday morning demonstration was a collected multi-trunk smoothleaf elm (Ulmus carpinifolia). The plant was selected because it featured five trunks growing from a single root system and, therefore, allowed for a discussion of clump style bonsai. Multi-trunk trees are frequently seen in nature but are sometimes overlooked as potential bonsai.

This style is rather simply handled as a group planting, but because the trunks are in fixed positions a certain amount of latitude must be allowed in developing the design. For instance, crossing trunks are often unavoidable with a clump style bonsai. The other important design consideration is choosing a front that best shows off the trunks in relation to one another and the roots.

Another interesting aspect of this material was that it offered a look at the handling and development of collected deciduous trees. The tree had been collected in the spring of 1987, was potted and cut to heights roughly proportionate to the trunk diameters. The branches and tops were trained from adventitious growth the plant developed after having been cut back severely.

The principle drawbacks with this technique are the abrupt change in trunk diameter at the apex and the unavoidable scar that results from cutting a large tree back severely. Although these problems slowly disappear with time certain steps can be taken to hide or soften them visually. I showed how to hide them behind some foliage and then using wood gouges and a mallet cut a long tapered section from the trunk to lengthen and shape the scar to add taper just below the apex. This works best when the cut can be placed on the back of the trunk, but since that is not always possible, it can be placed on the side or front, but the front should be avoided. Another possibility is to carve out a section between the apex and one or more branches.

The end result is a very respectable bonsai developed from collected material in only a little over three years.



Report from the PNBCA Convention XIV in September this year in Seattle.

Our Club had the largest participation attendance of all the clubs outside the Seattle host club. We had 11 members participating out of 61 and because of that the VIBC share of the net profits came to 9%.

Jack Sustic workshop—The workshop will be on 21 February from 09:00 to Noon, followed by a "demo" at 01:00 pm. At the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria, 1040 Moss Street.

Jack Sustic is the Curator of Bonsai at the US Arboretum in Washington, DC

Jack's visit is made possible by the Vancouver Island Bonsai Club, and he will be in Victoria on the very weekend of the Art Gallery's biennial Art in Bloom festival. We have allied ourselves with that initiative in our plans for his visit.

In the morning he will lead a workshop of ten Club members in the creation of a bonsai tree. After lunch, beginning at 1:00 pm, he will present an illustrated talk on "The Bonsai and Penjing Museum, Past, Present and Future" followed by a demonstration of hands-on bonsai design and creation.

This is a fund raising event for the Art Gallery so there is normally a significant charge for lectures; but, by special arrangement, members of the VIBC will be issued all day passes at rates every one can afford. Details of the program are yet to be worked out but you should reserve that Saturday for a special treat. Those attending will be treated to a tour of the extensive US National Collection of bonsai. Registration for the afternoon lecture entitles ticket holders to be present as "silent observers" in both morning workshop and afternoon lecture and demonstration.
