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A Bonsai Lesson



Most Bonsai artists will tell you that *Less is More.* This is a hard principle to grasp and not always the happiest!!

TABLE OF BROAD LEAVED TREES WHICH AIR LAYER EASILY


| Common Name | Best Time to Commence Layering | Time Taken to Root | Recommended Method | |
|-------------------------------|-----------------------------------|--------------------|----------------------|--|
| | | 0 | | |
| Alder | early summer | 6 weeks | ring bark | |
| Beech | early summer | 3 months | ring bark/tourniquet | |
| Boxwood | late spring | 3 months | sliver/tourniquet | |
| Elm | early summer | 6 weeks | ring bark | |
| Hornbeam | early summer | 4-5 months | ring bark or bridge | |
| lvy | early spring | 2-3 months | ring bark | |
| Japanese or Mountain Maple | early summer | 6-8 weeks | ring bark | |
| Trident Maple | early summer | 2-3 months | ring bark or sliver | |
| Willow | early summer/early fall | 4-6 weeks | ring bark | |
| Zelkova | early summer | 6-8 weeks | ring bark | |

Note: The ability to 'see' or visualise what the unstyled tree can become is directly related to your repertoire of skills as a bonsai artist. If you are not able to wire the tree meticulously, command the positioning of old branches by using rafila and wing strategies, or cave a trunk wonderfully to create the Illusion of age, you will 'see' substantially less potential in any tree than the individual who can. As a bonsai artist, your ability to 'see' the ultimate design is directly related to your ability to execute the design precisely using sound techniques.

I am forever amazed at how the right pot can immediately bring out the best qualities in a tree — even in a tree that is only halfway through the styling activity. This pot, created by Master Potter Ron Lang in the US, was wheel thrown with a white stoneware clay. It was fired raw, without glaze, in a wood kiln. Variegations and flashing effects to the clay body are the results of the ash deposits and salt added during firing. The pot style is 'dish' form. The dish shape presents a delicate profile with a narrow foot spreading out to a generous lip.



Wiring primary branches

Given the delicate nature of Kingsville branches, aluminium instead of copper should be used to wire the branches. With Kingsville, it is possible to leave the wires in place for up to 2 years; however, it you decide to feed the tree aggressively to generate desirable growth, you will need to monitor the biting in of the wires.

Final thoughts

This Kingsville has the potential to release increasing beauty over its lifetime. During the subsequent years, the tree will be refined based on my evolving vision of what I believe it can become. Clearly, my skills as an artist will play a primary role in what I can hope to achieve with not only this Kingsville, but with any potential bonsai that I encounter. In our quest for bonsai perfection, we will constantly be challenged to elevate our knowledge and execution of technique in ways that directly impact our ability to 'see' and release the beauty hidden in our trees.

I am pleased with the outcome of this work. The tree as presented imparts a sense of tranquillity and almost haunting beauty. The pot that so nicely frames this bonsal creation softens the composition and lightens the overall effect. It is deep enough to house a sufficient root pad and shallow enough to emphasise what is now a broad and majestic canopy. This Kingsville now begins its life as a bonsal.
