WINTER PROTECTION

At the January meeting we had a panel with six of our Club senior members (not in age but in bonsai experience) to discuss and answer questions regarding the protection of the trees in the Victoria weather conditions. Here is a brief summary of the major points:

1. Most evergreen trees need no protection, most other trees will be well protected by placing them under a bench where they can get some rain water. We only have to worry about those few nights below -5 deg.
2. The main killer is the cold wind. If you live in a windy area, keep the trees under a bench and cover the bench with poly film. Do not forget to water them weekly.
3. Roots must be protected, particularly in small pots, by burying the pot in the ground, or covering with bark mulch or leaves. If you bury the pot in the ground ensure that there is good drainage because excess water may cause root rot.
4. Those with trees on balconies can make a box with styrofoam or rigid insulation, place the tree inside and cover with poly film.
5. Protect small trees or delicate branches from the weight of wet snow. Too much snow, or snow melting off trees or eaves may snap branches.


GRAFTING

Grafting is one of the oldest known methods of plant propagation and dates back 2000 years or more. It is defined as the process of joining two plants or plant parts together in such a manner that they will unite and continue their growth as one. The main reason for grafting is to propagate plants that are difficult or impossible by other methods and to grow plants on roots other than their own for such purposes as size or disease control. Another important reason for the bonsai growers, is to modify the branch structure to suit tree design characteristics.

A graft consists of two parts, the scion and under-stock. The scion is of a short stem piece with two or more buds and is the part of the graft combination which develops into the top (shoot) of the plant. If the scion is reduced to a single bud with a thin slice of wood, the technique is called bud grafting or budding. The under-stock, also referred to as root-stock or stock, is the lower part that is integral with the root system.

Aeration, temperature, humidity, inherent capacity to form callus et-al, affect the success of the graft. Temperature, aeration and moisture, are primarily responsible for success or failure in most grafted plants. Temperature has the strongest effect. Warm temperatures promote callus formation, cool temperatures inhibit or reduce it, while extremely high temperatures are detrimental. High humidity is essential for callus formation and that is the reason grafts are waxed and/or tied, and often placed in high humidity chambers.

Numerous grafting methods exist, however, only a few are of major importance to nurseries. The most common are splice (fig 1), whip-and-tongue (fig 2), veneer and side (fig 3), saddle (fig 4), and cleft (fig 5).





WORLD BONSAI CONVENTION

Bonsai and Viewing Stone enthusiasts worldwide are planning to attend the 5th World Bonsai Convention in Washington, DC, **May 28-31**.

Held every fourth year (the last World Convention was 2001 and held in Munich) the one in which we take a special interest is to be hosted by the North American Bonsai Federation and sponsored by the American Bonsai Society, Bonsai Clubs International, the National Bonsai Foundation, the Potomac Bonsai Association and the U. S. National Arboretum. The four day event will take place at the Washington Hilton.

The convention will feature a prestigious assembly of international bonsai artists, among them some artist that we already know: Brook Zhao, Marco Invernezzi, Roy Nagatoshi and, representing Canada, Arthur Skolnik. There are, in addition, another 20 or more leading presenters from all corners of the world. Also one can expect a half a hundred or more vendors offering plenty of supplies and accessories for sale.
