It should be noted that this stone can certainly be displayed on the bed of gravel provided with the oval tray designed and thrown a number of years ago by the late Max Braverman of Arlington, WA. Alternately, if a proper wooden base is made it can be shown as an upright in the style of a Chinese Scholars' Rock.

Selecting primary, secondary, and tertiary branches

With the canopy opened from the proposed front, I continued to eliminate imi-eda, leaving many primary, secondary and tertiary branch selections, During the wiring process, many of these are likely to be removed to better achieve the desired bonsai illusion.

One of the greatest challenges facing the bonsai artist in working with Kingsville is reducing its massive canopy while retaining sufficient foliage to support the artistic composition. The only way to execute this task is to study each branch and determine its potential contribution to the creation. In this instance, there is clearly no substitute for experience.

The leaves on Kingsville are in opposite pairs and approximately a third of an inch in length. When pushing back growth on this species, it is important to leave at least 2-3 pairs of leaves to ensure ample sap flow to maintain the health of the branch and induce new growth.





p and grow

clip-and-grow method — a technique frequently applied to kingsville and other species that are typically difficult to wire — fails to provide the critical control required to position branches and achieve outstanding bonsai design. The ability to achieve the ultimate design objective for any bonsai is inevitably linked to one's ability to wire the tree confidently and effectively. Nothing is more critical to bonsai excellence than mastering wiring techniques.

To better relate the sequence of events that led to the final design of the tree. I am resorting to the use of key photographs, each of which contains a detailed caption. Although supplemental photographs could have been taken to document the styling, my preference during the styling activity was to maintain as much spontaneity throughout the design activity as possible.


Correcting parallel branch structure

This view is from the side of the tree. The parallel branch structure creates a visually boring image because of the mirrored branch movement. It must be fixed.

After some study, I decided to remove the entire lower branch. This decision not only eliminated the parallel branch structure, but opened up the back of the free, creating a space soon to be filled by drawing down branches located higher in the canopy. In this living art, less is often more.



Reduced root ball prior to Potting

With the canopy roughly opened up for detailed pruning and the subsequent wiring, I decided to focus on the task of reducing the massive root ball to accommodate a 7.5cm deep pot with a 42.5cm diameter. Much work remains to be done at this point.





Exposed nebari

Three major nebari were exposed to support the bonsal illusion. Properly exposed roots emphasise the bonding of a tree with the earth, and this sense of unity never fails to capture the attention and imagination of the viewers.
