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BONSAI WORKSHOP AND DEMO BY JIM DOYLE July 1st and 2nd

Well known across North America Jim Doyle will be coming to the Pacific Northwest and British Columbia as part of our Canada Day Celebration. Jim is proprietor of Nature's Way Nursery in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

Our club will be hosting the visit to Victoria and the plans are as follows:

- Friday July 1, Canada Day, Jim will work under a private agreement, paid for by the members of our Study Group, in an all day session.
- Morning of Saturday July 2 at 9 AM, Jim will conduct a workshop for 10 of our club members working with Hinoki cypress. All participants will be working with the same species and the charge for this workshop will be \$85.00 which includes the tree. No charge for silent observers.



Extensive internal branch structure
This network of branches may appear to be a
problem, but to the trained eye of the experienced artist, this wealth of healthy branches
presents a myriad of design possibilities.

Elimination of three major branches from the proposed front

While Kingsville can be 'pushed' through intensive chemical feeding to generate remarkable growth during a single growing season, this species lignifies new growth at an extremely slow pace. For this reason, each branch was carefully studied to determine its contribution to the anticipated design for the tree. As you will see by following the sequence of photographs that follows, the pruning process was executed slowly, while the completed bonsai illusion was kept in mind.



The Styling

With the design of the old Kingsville engraved in my mind, I initiated the styling by selecting the optimal front for the composition. Selection of the front was based on the location of the nebari (surface roots), the potential for new surface root development, and the general orientation of the undisturbed tree. With the front now selected, three major branches were removed on the lower-trunk area to better reveal trunk movement. These branches have been removed and only the wounds are shown in Photograph 3. As the branch selection process continued, I considered how each branch element would or would not contribute to the total harmony of the tree. To resolve these design decisions, I imagined what key branches would look like if they were wired and positioned.

Removing lmi-eda to expose the interior beauty of the tree

While beauty in is the eye of the beholder, the bonsai artist must also become detached from the tree and study it with unrelenting objectivity. Branch selections were based on constructing the movement of the tree visually (the primary line running from the base of the trunk to the apex of the tree), and evaluating the lachiagari (the section of the trunk from the base to the lowest branch), Propedy executed branch removals will create a visual balance between positive and negative space.

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
